READER MODE

With these simple steps, you can use Reader Mode to create a distraction-free reading experience in Safari on your Apple Devices.

Reader Mode On the Mac

- Open Safari and navigate to a web page that you want to read.
- Look for the Reader View icon in the Smart Search field at the top of the window. The icon is typically represented by four horizontal lines.
- Click on the Reader View icon to activate Reader Mode. This will remove extraneous content from the page and create a simplified, easy-to-read version of the article.
- To customize the appearance of Reader Mode, click on the "Aa" button in the toolbar.

 This will give you options to adjust the font size, style, and background color of the page.
- To exit Reader Mode and return to the original web page, click on the "X" button in the top left corner of the window, or press the "Esc" key on your keyboard.

Reader Mode On the iPad and iPhone

READING LIST

Reading List On the Mac

- On a Mac:
- Open Safari and navigate to a web page that you want to add to Reading List.
- Click on the "Add to Reading List" button in the toolbar. This button is represented by a pair of glasses.
- To access your Reading List, click on the "Reading List" button in the toolbar. This button is represented by a pair of glasses with a number next to it, indicating how many items are in your Reading List.
- To remove an item from your Reading List, right-click on the item and select "Remove Item".
- To mark an item as read, right-click on the item and select "Mark as Read".

Reading List On the iPad and iPhone

- Open Safari and navigate to a web page that you want to add to Reading List.
- Tap and hold the "Add Bookmark" button in the toolbar. This button is represented by a rectangle with an arrow pointing upward.
- Tap "Add to Reading List" in the menu that appears.
- To access your Reading List, tap the "Bookmarks" button in the toolbar, then tap the "Reading List" tab at the top of the screen.
- To remove an item from your Reading List, swipe left on the item and tap "Delete".
- To mark an item as read, swipe left on the item and tap "Mark as Read".



PRIVATE BROWSING MODE

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Private Browsing with Safari is a great option for sensitive online activities. When you open a private window in Safari, your browsing history, cookies, and other data are not saved. This means that you can browse the web without leaving behind a trail of your online activity. Private Browsing is ideal for situations where you want to keep your browsing history private, such as when you're using a public computer or when you're browsing sensitive websites.

Private Browsing Mode for the Mac, iPad, and iPhone

- To open a private window in Safari on a Mac, iPad, or iPhone, follow these steps:
- Open Safari.
- On a Mac, click on "File" in the menu bar at the top of the screen. On an iPad or iPhone, long press on the "Tabs" button in the toolbar.
- Select "New Private Tab (or Window)".
- A new private window will open, and the address bar will have a dark gray background indications it is Private.


To take a screenshot of a web page and save it as a PDF in Safari on an iPad or iPhone, follow these steps:


- Open Safari and navigate to the web page you want to save as a PDF.

- Tape "Done" for options on saving the PDF. This will convert the screenshot into a PDF document. You can then save the PDF to your device or share it with others using AirDrop, Messages, or email.
